Exploring Options to Live on Campus:

Instructor Guide/Lesson Plan



Materials:

- 1. Exploring Options to Live on Campus: Student Guide
- 2. A writing utensil
- 3. Independent Living Supports and Services Fact Sheets
- 4. A highlighter

Time Needed: Two 50-minute class periods

Prior Knowledge: Students should have prior knowledge about the four IPSE programs in Missouri. Students should also have prior knowledge about skills related to independent living.

Introduction: There are four different Inclusive Post-Secondary Education (IPSE) programs in Missouri. Those programs are located across the state and are housed at four different Institutions of Higher Education, also known as Colleges or Universities. The four IPSE programs and locations are:

- 1. Succeed Program at the University Missouri St. Louis in St. Louis
- 2. PAWS Program at the University of Missouri- Columbia
- 3. Bear POWER Program at the Missouri State University in Springfield
- 4. THRIVE Program at University of Central Missouri in Warrensburg

Purpose: The Show Me College website has several resources for students, families, instructors, and support staff. The purpose of this activity is to help students identify their preferences related to living on campus and use the *Independent Living Supports and Services Fact Sheets* to determine which IPSE program(s) align with a student's preferences.

Directions:

- 1. To start the activity, explain that there are several places to live when you go to college (i.e., living oncampus or living off-campus). Where students live will impact aspects of their college experience, including how students get to and from class and whether students live with a roommate.
- 2. Explain the purpose of the activity

- 3. Define living on-campus and describe the different types of on-campus living options as well as the supports that may be provided by Resident Advisors (RAs) in these setting
 - a. Dorms/dorm room styles (e.g., singles, doubles, suites)
 - b. On-campus apartments
- 4. Describe the supports that may be provided by Resident Advisors (RAs) while living on-campus
- 5. Define/describe living off-campus
 - a. Off-campus apartments
 - b. Living at home
- 6. Students can write or discuss their own definitions of living on-campus and living off-campus to demonstrate their understanding of these concepts
- 7. Discuss the pros and cons of living on- and off-campus, ensuring that roommates and transportation are discussed
- 8. Students can write pros and cons of living on- and off-campus on their worksheet to demonstrate their understanding and begin to identify their preferences
- 9. Then, explain and describe that regardless of where students live, they will have access to support staff on campus, they may need to eat on campus, and will need to think about what would make them feel safe on campus.
- 10. Introduce the "My Preferences" portion of the Student Guide and have students complete this section of their worksheet.
- 11. Instructors can then distribute the Independent Living Supports and Services Fact Sheets. Given students' prior knowledge about the IPSE programs in Missouri, instructors can pass out all four Fact Sheets, provide students with one Fact Sheet at a time, or give students the Fact Sheet for specific programs they have a previous interest in.
- 12. Students can then read through the Fact Sheet and highlight items that align with the preferences they identified in the "My Preferences" portion of the student guide.

Conclusion and Wrap Up: After students have completed the graphic organizer, ask whether they believe a specific program aligns with specific preferences. Remind students that it is okay if a preferred program does not align with each preference a student has. Instructors can collect student guides or allow students to share their guides with family members and guardians.
